## Greetings, Minor Memorial UMC Family!

As we have arrived in the month of November, our church family continues to do the amazing work of discipleship, both inside the walls of the church and out into our community. So, as we head into the new month of Fall Festival and the end of daylight saving time, our focus shifts towards the God-centered practice of Christian stewardship.

I think it's worth exploring both what stewardship is and what it isn't. Stewardship is understood on the basis that God is the owner of all things, meaning that God has entrusted these things to us for a specific purpose. Perhaps we can define stewardship as the careful and prayerful use of God's resources for the accomplishment of our goals in honoring God. That's what it *is*, so here's what it *isn't*. Stewardship is not a programmatic scheme or drive to increase the wealth of the church. Rather, it is a shared effort to meet God-given goals for the world *through* our church. This includes our financial resources, yes, but also so much more. This includes our salvation in God, living out the Gospels, how we are educated, what our spiritual gifts are, how we care for the environment, our talents, our jobs, our homes-all of these belong to God, but God gives us these for our responsible use in achieving His ends.

Realistically speaking, financial resources are necessary for the operation of the church and its continuation of ministries in the name of Jesus Christ. This news is not new. But in the age of ever-increasing costs for basic living, financial stewardship becomes a complicated issue. Our church budget illustrates the means by which our finance committee, through prayerful discernment, believes that our operation and ministries should most effectively and efficiently be handled. I commend them on their work during this season. But as difficult as navigating our personal finances have become, we must declare that even this should not take the focus off of our mission to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world. And the way to do this is to not focus the idea of stewardship primarily on finances, but rather on our utilization of all of God's resources.

So while it's true that our time, talent, and financial resources are very important in considering stewardship, let's not forget one other thing that's required: your spirit. Your willingness to offer all that God has given you for His purpose is what proper stewardship is all about. I'm reminded of the Charles Wesley hymn "A Charge to Keep I Have," where Wesley reminds us in the first two verses, "A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify, a never-dying soul to save, and fit it for the sky. To serve the present age, my calling to fulfill, O may it all my pow'rs engage to do my Master's will!"

In the month of November, you will have the opportunity to express your level of stewardship and giving of your time, talent, financial resources, AND your spirit by considering how you will "keep your charge," so to speak. In fact, this commitment effort is all a part of "Our Charge to Keep," which is our worship focus for this month. It will culminate in you making that commitment during our Stewardship/Thanksgiving Sunday on November 19th and our United Methodist Student Day on November 26th. The time to begin praying about this is now.

I'll close with the words from the prophet Joshua, who summed up stewardship in chapter 24:14-15: "Now, therefore, revere the Lord and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt and serve the Lord. Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living, but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."






# FROM THE PASTOR'S BOOKSHELF



# **Greetings from the Finance Committee**

First, thank you to those that support the ministries here at Minor. We would not have a preacher, a worship leader/ secretary, a financial secretary, or a cleaning crew if it were not for your giving, those of you that follow Jesus' command, "to love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." These employees give of themselves to bring God glory through their work. A majority of our budget goes to pay their salaries. If you looked in last month's newsletter at the giving for the month of September, you would have noticed we were almost \$5000 short. How does that happen? I believe many of us put ourselves before God and we look at the income we bring in as ours not God's. We don't give back to God what actually belongs to God. She was confronted with a terrible choice. Her mother was seriously ill, and her family didn't have food to eat. Ruse chose to spend 3 years in a brothel giving of herself to save her mother and siblings. This is the same kind of love Christ lavished on us. But Jesus is not impressed by our money we give but by our OBEDIENCE to give. Please join me in being faithful and obedient in giving and living for Jesus. There is so much more we can do to bring God's Kingdom here on earth with your love and support.
